Selecting appropriate flooring for bathrooms and wet rooms can help improve safety, simplify cleaning routines and support long-term durability within residential properties.

Bedrooms

Bedrooms typically prioritise comfort, acoustic control and overall residential usability. Flooring within these spaces should provide a warm and comfortable underfoot experience while also helping to minimise impact noise transfer between adjoining rooms and floors.

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Acoustic flooring solutions can be particularly beneficial within apartments, build-to-rent developments and multi-occupancy housing schemes where noise reduction is an important consideration.
